When America First Met China

A Lecture by Eric Jay Dolin

Tuesday, September 18, 7:00 p.m.

Salem's early trade with China resulted in economic and political influences that have lasted for centuries. Historian Eric Jay Dolin will explore them with us on September 18, as the Athenæum kicks off its fall program season.



In his third appearance at the Athenæum, Dolin discusses his new book, When America First Met China: An Exotic History of Tea, Drugs, and Money in the Age of Sail. Revisiting his fascination with the ways early New England trade practices shaped America, Dolin examines America's relationship with China through the lens of the tea, silk, and opium trade. Illuminating one of the least understood areas of American history, Dolin traces our fraught relationship with China back to its roots and sheds light on our modern relationship with China. Indeed, this trade relationship might have catalyzed America's international economy, but it also sparked an ecological and human rights catastrophe that can still be felt today.

Fall Course The Timeless and Inimitable Charles Dickens

Dorothy Dudley, instructor Saturdays from 2:30 to 4:30 p.m. Sept. 22, 29; Oct 6, 13, 20, 27; Nov. 3, 10

As part of the bicentenary celebration of Charles Dickens' birth, the Salem Athenæum presents an in-depth look at the life and work this most-beloved 19th-century British writer. This 8-week course, designed and conducted by Dorothy Dudley, will extend our experience beyond Dickens' genius as a storyteller and emphasize his cognizance of contemporary social issues and the rising anxiety of a nation in the throes of radical change.

We trace Dickens' maturation with the nearly autobiographical *David Copperfield*, a masterful mix of humor and pathos. Then, we turn to two of his less well-known works: *Hard Times* and *A Tale of Two Cities*.

Opportunities to view the film versions of *David Copperfield* and *A Tale of Two Cities* will also be offered after two of the class meetings.

Dorothy Dudley has taught English and American literature at Tufts University for the past ten years. In addition to teaching, she has also led her students on five "literary pilgrimages" to the UK and Spain, following in the footsteps of authors including: the Brontës, Jane Austen, Thomas Hardy, Hemingway, Orwell, and Shakespeare. Dorothy is an avid Dickens scholar and a member of the International Dickens Fellowship.



Former People

A lecture by Doug Smith

Thursday, October 18, 7:00 p.m.

Epic in scope, precise in detail, and heart-breaking in its human drama, *Former People* is the first book to recount the history of the aristocracy caught up in the maelstrom of the Bolshevik Revolution and the birth of Stalin's Russia.

Former U.S. Diplomat and Soviet Affairs Analyst Douglas Smith chronicles the fate of two great

aristocratic families--the Sheremetevs and the Golitsyns--and reveals how even in the depths of terror, daily life went on.

When discussing what he'd like readers to take away from his book, Smith says, "While working on the book, I had people in the West ask me why I was even bothering with the nobility, implying that they had gotten what they deserved and that their fate need not concern us. If I've done my job, no one will read *Former People* and continue to think that the fate of these people does not speak to all of us."

Douglas Smith has a doctorate in history from UCLA. Over the past 25 years, Smith has made many trips to Russia. In the 1980s, he was a Russian-speaking guide on the U.S. State Department's exhibition "Information USA" that traveled throughout the USSR. He has worked as a Soviet affairs analyst at Radio Free Europe and served as an interpreter for late President Reagan. An awarding-winning historian and translator, he has authored four books on Russia.

Spring Course Preview Ibsen, Shaw, Chekhov: Modern Masters

Theo Theoharis, instructor 6 Saturdays starting March 2







Each of these three dramatists transformed drama, both its writing and performing, so powerfully and comprehensively that they effectively created the modern form of the art.

We will read two plays by each: Ghosts and Hedda Gabler by Ibsen, Major Barbara and Heartbreak House by Shaw, and The Seagull and Uncle Vanya by Chekhov. Together we will analyze how each writer handled dialogue, characterization, and theme; and how the three created a new theater--one whose shape and style reaches straight through to Harold Pinter, Samuel Beckett, and David Mamet.

Theoharis has lectured widely on American and European literature both in the United States and abroad. He is author of James Joyce's Ulysses: An Anatomy of the Soul and Ibsen's Drama: Right Action and Tragic Joy, and well as the translator of Before They Could Change Them: The Complete Poems of Constantine P. Cavafy. He has received teaching awards from UC Berkeley, MIT and Harvard. He has taught courses on the epic, tragedy, and
