Letter from the President

Dear Members and Friends:

Our year at the Athenæum begins in May, and I am pleased to report to you for the first time as President of the Board of Trustees.

At our annual meeting, we marked the election and departure of trustees. Joining the Board are Abby Burns, Judy Kearney and Eric Hayes. Leaving the board are David Ashton, Francie King, and Mary Simpson.

Our past year under the leadership of President Francie King was remarkable:

Eleven Lectures and Readings; Eight Salons; Five Parties; Four Exhibits; Three Courses; Two Festivals; and One Published Book. The building hosted language classes, writing workshops, and civic meetings. We were part of the Christmas in Salem Tour. We have launched a major effort for conservation of our Collection, developed a new logo, and expanded our garden.

The above list is not all-inclusive, but is indicative of the hum of activity that lurks behind the quiet façade of The Salem Athenæum.

First Conservation Night: A Great Success!

The Athenæum's first-ever Conservation Night, held June 5, was an unmitigated success! It also proved, said library director Jean Marie Procious, that the library's patrons are enthusiastic and supportive of the library's efforts to preserve its historic collection.

A History of King Philip's War

The evening featured a presentation by book conservator Marie Oedel on book conservation and an examination of each book to be preserved. She explained what was required for each of the 20 volumes selected for the project, which has become known as the Adopt-a-Book program. The work will range from building protective boxes to complete rebinding. Director Procious described each book's importance to the library's collection.

Of the 50 attendees, the evening produced a list of 35 members and friends of the Athenæum who will sponsor 12 books for conservation and preservation--some by taking on the full cost of the work of their chosen book and others through individual shares. Four of the books were fully sponsored by individuals, and eight were jointly sponsored.

Four books on offer received partial pledges towards their conservation, and these are now the focus of the conservation planning team led by Trustees Stephen Clark and Donna Seger, managers of the Adopt-a-Book program.

The four books still in need of additional partial sponsorship include:

- A History of King Philip's War (Church, 1827)
 2 shares of \$205 pledged; 2 shares of \$205 each available.
 This early history is a rare book that must be conserved to survive.
- The World in Miniature or Entertaining Traveller Giving an Account of

Every Thing Necessary and Curious in Two Volumes (Vol. 2)

A full sponsorship of \$600 or 2 shares of \$300 each available.

The cost to conserve Volume 1 has been pledged. It is particularly important that sponsors for Volume 2 be found since conservation work for both volumes should be done at the same time.

- Travels in Turkey, Asia Minor, Syria and Across the Desert into Egypt During the Years 1799, 1800 and 1801 (Wittman, London, 1803)
 2 shares of \$175 pledged; 2 shares of \$175 each available. This rare book, with its fine illustrations, needs two more sponsors.
- Resurrection (Tolstoy, New York, 1900)
 1 share of \$250 pledged; 1 share of \$250 available. This first edition needs one more sponsor.

Work on the sponsored books gets underway this summer. The finished books will be displayed during the library's second Conservation Night in June 2013, at which time a new list of treasured historic books from the Athenæum collection will be available for preservation.

All book sponsors will be permanently recognized in their chosen book by a bookplate designed by Salem artist and Athenæum Proprietor Julie Lutts.

Fall Course The Timeless and Inimitable Charles Dickens

Dorothy Dudley, instructor Saturdays from 2:30 to 4:30 p.m. Sept. 22, 29; Oct 6, 13, 20, 27; Nov. 3, 10

As part of the bicentenary celebration of Charles Dickens' birth, the Salem Athenæum presents an in-depth look at the life and work this most-beloved 19th-century British writer. This 8-week course, designed and conducted by Dorothy Dudley, will extend our experience beyond Dickens' genius as storyteller and emphasize his cognizance of contemporary social issues and the rising anxiety of a nation in the throes of radical change.

We trace Dickens' maturation with the nearly autobiographical *David Copperfield*, a masterful mix of humor and pathos. Then, we turn to two of his less well-known works: *Hard Times* and *A Tale of Two Cities*.

Hard Times takes satirical aim at social concerns including: the effect of Utilitarian philosophy on child-rearing; industrialization; labor unions; the rise of the middle class. A Tale of Two Cities, considered by many to be the least "Dickensian" novel, recalls the tensions and anxieties of the French Revolution. (Dr. Sue Schopf has agreed to supplement this novel with background material on the French Revolution.) Written in 1859, when Dickens' enormous professional success was threatened by a tumultuous revolution in his personal life, A Tale of Two Cities depicts the conflicts in Dickens' life and in Victorian England. In both cases, "It was the best of times, it was the worst of times. . ."

Opportunities to view the film versions of *David Copperfield* and *A Tale of Two Cities* will also be offered after two of the class meetings.

Dorothy Dudley has taught English and American literature at Tufts University for the past ten years. In addition to teaching, she has also led her students on five "literary pilgrimages" to the UK and

Spain, following in the footsteps of authors including: the Brontës, Jane Austen, Thomas Hardy, Hemingway, Orwell, and Shakespeare. Dorothy is an avid Dickens scholar and a member of the International Dickens Fellowship.


