Athenaeum Launches a Book Conservation Initiative

A principal attraction of the Athenæum is its exceptional collection of 18th and 19th century rare books. Unless you have visited the stacks lately, you may not be aware of how many of our most-beloved volumes are in dire need of repair.



To address our conservation needs systematically, the Athenæum is initiating an annual "Adopt-a-Book" conservation program. This spring we will hold our first Conservation Night to match individual books in our core collection in need of work with a member or members working together who volunteer to underwrite the cost of restoration. Those who adopt a book will be thanked in a special bookplate to be affixed in each renewed volume.



Snow Policy

During the winter months, if a city-wide parking ban is announced, the Athenæum will be closed.

Any events or meetings scheduled that day will be cancelled. Events will be rescheduled whenever possible.

The Collections Committee selected 22 candidate books for work. The Athenæum then retained Marie Oedel, a Proprietor of the Salem Athenæum and books conservator for the library of the Boston Museum of Fine Arts, to prepare a condition and recommended treatment report for each. The Athenæum is now obtaining price proposals from select bookbinders and conservators for all 22 volumes. Depending on need, cost and practicality, the Collections Committee will select 10 to 15 books to be offered at the first annual conservation night next spring for sponsorship.

Once all the restoration work is completed the restored volumes will be on view at the second annual conservation night in 2013, when a second group of treasured books will be offered for adoption by generous members.

Bicentennial Book

It's here! *The Salem Athenæum in 2010:* A *Bicentennial Celebration* is printed and ready for your perusal.

Featuring crisp black-and-white images and reproductions of decorative printers' marks from our collection, this elegant gold-stamped cloth-bound volume documents the Athenæum's 200th year.



The Salem Athenæum in 2010 presents a history of the library since 1910, written by historian and teacher Charles Newhall (a past president of the Athenæum); a survey of highlights from our collections, collecting practices through the century, and the library's decorative holdings are presented by Athenæum Director Jean Marie Procious.

We are deeply pleased that former Chief Justice Margaret Marshall of the Massachusetts Supreme Judicial Court allowed us to reprint her remarks from the opening night of our joint exhibition of the 1629 Massachusetts Bay Charter with the Peabody Essex Museum--a highlight of our Bicentennial year.

The book includes stunning images of the library; a list of the programs offered throughout the bicentennial year; records of Athenæum Proprietors in 2010, along with the names of the original owners of their library shares; a list of librarians since 1812; the Athenæum By-laws; and the roster of the 2010 Board of Trustees.

Printed in a limited edition of just 200 copies, we urge you to secure yours while supplies last for \$30.


New Book Groups


For January we are reading *The Marriage Plot* by Jeffrey Eugenides.

Emily Dickinson and Judge Lord of Salem

Although Emily Dickinson never married, her evocative poems have provoked much scholarly speculation about her love life. According to Susan Snively, a poet and Dickinson scholar who taught at Amherst College for 27 years, Dickinson's poems and letters reveal her romance with the eminent Massachusetts Supreme Court Judge Otis Phillips Lord, her father's friend from Salem.

Snively will focus on both the known facts of the fascinating relationship between Emily Dickinson and Judge Lord, and on the controversies it has provoked among biographers and critics.

Robert Browning at 200: The Case of the Accidental Victorian

Tuesday, Feb. 28, 7:00 p.m.

Frequently remembered for his romantic elopement to Italy with Elizabeth Barrett--a poet more famous than himself at the time--Browning is unquestionably the most modern of all the Victorian poets, both in terms of his experiments in poetic form and in the subjects of his verse. In probing the psychology of his characters. Browning a

probing the psychology of his characters, Browning addressed every modern anxiety with surprising frankness.

His poems consider provocative topics such as sexuality and gender roles, the breakdown of a marriage, religious skepticism and the will to believe, the psychology of the artist, the relativity of truth and perception, the logic of the deranged mind, the deep longing for the infinite, and the transforming power of love.





The course will be taught by Dr. Theoharis C. Theoharis, who has lectured widely on American and European literature both in the United States and abroad. He is author of James Joyce's Ulysses: An Anatomy of the Soul and Ibsen's Drama: Right Action and Tragic Joy, and well as the translator of Before They Could Change Them: The Complete Poems of Constantine P. Cavafy. He has received teaching awards from UC Berkeley, MIT, and Harvard. He has taught courses on the epic, tragedy, and modern fiction

at Harvard for the last 25 years.

There is also a Miss Havisham table, with her wedding parasol, shoes, portrait, various interpretations of Miss Havisham, and of course, a coating of cobwebs.

Special Salon: Echoes of Salem in the Historic Non-Catholic Cemetery in Rome

On November 18, Nicholas Stanley-Price, a specialist in cultural heritage preservation who serves on the Advisory Committee of Rome's Non-Catholic Cemetery, gave a slide show presentation at the Athenæum.

This cemetery contains possibly the highest density of famous and important graves anywhere in the world, including the final resting-place of poets

Shelley and Keats. Notable Salem natives, Sarah Parker Remond, William Wetmore Story, and members of the Crowninshield family rest here.

This season's tour, "Rediscover the McIntire District" highlighted the work of architect William G.
