MISSION STATEMENT OF THE SALEM ATHENÆUM

The Salem Athenæum is a contemporary and historic library, dedicated to enriching the lives of its members and its North Shore community by lending, preserving, and adding to its collection of books and documents, by maintaining and enhancing its historic building and grounds, and by offering cutural and educational programs that provide a forum for the exchange of ideas and life-long learning.

Dear Members and Friends,

A mong the Athenæum's myriad gems is our original Minute-Book, a beautiful oversized volume bound in leather, worn and softened with almost two centuries of use. Only a cold-hearted reader could leaf through the carefully penned records contained in that treasure-trove and fail to take pride and inspiration from the vision and accomplishments of our founding members. Care, concern and affection for our library is evident throughout. To read those faded pages is to be reminded that it has never been easy to establish and maintain a not-for-profit cultural institution, perhaps especially one dedicated to literature and reading.

The Athenæum was formed out of the realization that neither the Social Library of 1760 nor the Philosophical Library of 1781 was likely to flourish over the long term on its own, although taken together they formed the most outstanding private library collection in the Americas, excepting only Benjamin Franklin's Philadelphia Library Company. In combining those two organizations to form the Athenæum in 1810, Edward Augustus Holyoke and his colleagues were looking to the future and adapting to the times, and so must we.

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We're making progress. Over the last two years alone our membership has sharply increased as the Athenæum increasingly attracts enthusiastic and appreciative new members from Nahant to Beverly Farms and beyond, as well as from Salem.

While our membership base is broadening and deepening, the ranks of our volunteers are swelling with dedicated helpers with all kinds of skills: from gardening to book conservation to membership development to public relations. Every volunteer is vital and we will reach out to those who have offered their services but have not yet been contacted.

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Sadly, we must say farewell to two of our most loyal and dedicated Proprietors. **Tim and Linda Jenkins** are leaving us for Virginia. We could fill this entire newsletter with the things one or the other, or both, did for the Athenæum.

As a member of the board, Tim has exemplified what it means to serve as a trustee. With unflagging energy he has scrutinized and helped shape our investment portfolio and financial operations. He has shovelled our snow, taken out our trash, supervised our contractors, and on countless occasions, responded to our alarm in the dead of night; and he did all of these things and many more with a smile. Linda, a gifted and published poet, organized and charmingly ran our first poetry night, which is becoming an enchanting tradition. She founded the popular Scrabble Club, and also devoted her formidable analytical powers and experience in the business world to help us improve our management skills. Hoping their departure will not be permanent, your Board has voted to extend to Tim and Linda lifetime privileges of membership as a token of our gratitude and affection.

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The painting of the exterior of our building has been completed, returning the facade to the splendor it deserves. Inside, the stacks of our rare book room have been mapped and cleaned with the skilled and loving care of **Winnie Wilkens**, **Marla Gearhart** and **Elaine von Bruns**. Jim **Austin**'s thoughtful attention is evident throughout the building. In the garden, **Pamela and Richard Jendrysik** have watered and weeded all summer to keep us in shape. **Jessica Barnett** is doing a wonderful and much-needed job with publicity.

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The outstanding line-up of programs and activities planned for the coming year (detailed on the inserted pages) is founded on more than a decade of efforts by trustees, proprietors, subscribers and, of course, our esteemed librarian emeritus, John Adams. Success such as this does not happen overnight. Particular tribute must be paid to **Dr. Sue Schopf** and her Education Committee for this unprecedented array of stimulating and ground-breaking offerings to our members and the public.

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Your trustees are especially proud to have been able to hire from among many strong candidates a talented and resourceful new director, **Jean Marie Procious.** Working together we will continue to conserve and enhance our treasured collection, improve the physical amenities of our building and grounds, develop and expand our programs, and diligently seek to find ways to stabilize and increase our endowment.

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With the help and support of us all, Jean Marie will lead us into our third century with every reason to believe that for all its achievements in the past, the Athenæum's best days lie ahead.
