Letter from the President

Dear Athenæum Members and Friends,

Welcome to spring--finally! We're awaiting the explosion of color from the back-garden rhododendrons at the library. If you've never seen this extravaganza, do yourself a favor and plan to visit us this month.

Though we happily bid winter adieu, there is much to look back on with pleasure. Our March Monopoly fundraiser was a great success, thanks to many generous donors and partygoers. The library was transformed into a splendid game parlor, complete with a 1930s-style lounge on the second floor. In fact, our guests liked the comfort and ease of that transformed second floor so much that we're going to keep some of the comfortable furnishings as they were during the party. A Book to Commemorate the 2010 Bicentennial

In 1917, the Salem Athenæum published a slim little book detailing the library's origins and history over its first 100 years. In 2011, we'll honor that volume with one of our own to mark the library's second 100 years.





Now in production, this commemorative book will include highlights of our history and an exploration of our historic and contemporary collections, along with remarks made by Margaret Marshall, former Chief Justice of the Massachusetts Supreme Judicial Court, during the October 2010 exhibition at the Peabody Essex Museum of the Athenæum's Endecott Charter. The book will also show the programs offered at the library during 2010, along with the names of current Proprietors and Trustees; elegant black-and-white photos will capture the Athenæum as it looks today.



The book is being made possible partly through a grant from the Essex National Heritage Commission. It is slated for completion in late June and will be on sale for \$30 in the library this summer. Members can reserve advance copies for \$25 each by calling the Athenæum at 978-744-2540 before July 1.

Romantic Composers Course Begins May 5

Thursdays, from 7:00-9:00 p.m. May 5, 12, 19, and 26.

The two-hundredth birthdays of Chopin and Schumann were celebrated worldwide in 2010, and 2011 marks the two-hundredth anniversary of Liszt's birth. In honor of these brilliant and innovative composer-performers, The Salem Athenæum announces a four-week course featuring lectures and performances of the music of Chopin, Schumann, and Lizt in an intimate setting--the grand drawing room of a private home on Chestnut Street.



Instructor Dr. Eric Chafe of Brandeis University will employ an interdisciplinary method, comparing works and styles of musical Romanticism with representative writings and art by Novalis and Caspar David Friedrich. Schumann's *Carnival and Fantasie* for piano, his *Dichterliebe* for voice and piano, Liszt's *Sonata in B minor* and *Un sospiro* for piano, his *Faust Symphony*, and Chopin's *Two Nocturnes*, *op. 27*, will comprise the core of the musical works to be explored.

The course will be given on four consecutive Thursday evenings, May 5, 12, 19, and 26, from 7:00 to 9:00 p.m. at 10 Chestnut Street. This is an outstanding opportunity to experience these works in an environment much like that in which they were originally performed. We cordially invite you to join us for this very special experience.



Dickens was Louisa May Alcott's favorite contemporary author and she met him twice. Over time, the two authors, from two continents, found two distinct literary voices that kindled and echoed their concern for social injustice, the poor, family ties, love, and life.



Jan Turnquist, Executive Director of Orchard House (the Alcott family house and museum, in Concord, Mass.), has portrayed Louisa May Alcott in Public Service Announcements currently running nationally on FOX, for PBS, in several BBC productions, and for First Lady, Laura Bush.

The performance is a blend of stage drama and living history. After a minor carriage accident, Miss Alcott will enter the building and wait for repairs to be completed. Prepare to travel back in time to meet her. She may even have a basket filled with apple slump, an Alcott family recipe.
