ere at the Athenæum, we do not like to say goodbye to our members.

Fortunately, we are not often called upon to do so. At the special meeting of our Proprietors, held in April to discuss our copy of the Charles I Charter, our full house included many octogenarians. Some of them represent an unbroken line of family involvement and support dating back to our 1810 incorporation, and all remain fiercely loyal and committed to the Athenæum's survival and continued success.

The evening was spent in thorough, thoughtful, and at times impassioned debate about the possible deaccessioning of the Charter.

More recently (May 3rd), we held our Annual Meeting. It marked the end of the six-year term of Winifred Wilkens, an extraordinary trustee. We took this opportunity to establish a new award named in honor of our renowned first president, Edward Augustus Holyoke, and she is the first recipient (See article on next page.) As was Dr. Holyoke, Winnie is passionate in her love of books and all that they repre-

sent. Over the course of its existence, the Athenæum has never had a more zealous and skilled advocate than Winnie, and it is fitting that her name be linked with that of our founder in perpetuity. A plaque will be hung in the main room to memorialize the award, with space for the names of future recipients.

We are also fortunate in having three new trustees join us last month: Francie King, Dick Jendrysik, and Trip Mason. Each brings a wealth of experience and fresh enthusiasm to the Athenæum.

As we start a new fiscal year, the issue of how best to deal with our copy of the famous Charter remains high on our list of priorities. We thank all of you who have contacted us with your ideas and opinions. In seeking to reach a full understanding and appreciation of every element of this crucial issue, your Board has expended a tremendous amount of effort. We will continue to do so until we are confident that nothing has been overlooked.

We look forward to seeing you all at the Garden Party on June 11th!

WILKENS RECEIVES NEW AWARD

In recognition of her six years of dedicated and tireless service as a member of the board of trustees, on May 3rd, the Salem Athenæum bestowed the Edward Augustus Holyoke Award upon Winifred Wilkens of Salem. She becomes the first recipient of this new honor, which is named for a founder of The Salem Athenæum. It recognizes those who exemplify the founding spirit and purpose of The Athenæum.

As member of the Board and as Clerk, Wilkens has given inspired leadership to the care, maintenance and preservation of the book collections since 2003, when she retired from Harvard University. She previously worked in the libraries of the departments of Chemistry and Botany at Harvard and her library experiences also include a corporate library focused on computer sciences in New Jersey and the Marine Sciences Consortium library in Sandy Hook, NJ.

EDUCATION COMMITTEE REPORT

Tudging from the increased attendance at our events, the cities and towns beyond the Salem area from which participants are coming, and the many new members gained this year, word is getting out that the programs at the Athenæum represent an exciting and informative feast of ideas. Standing-room-only events included the Benjamin Franklin Tercentenary Celebration with Robert Allison, Emerson W. Baker II's talk on the Quakers in Salem and New England, Marjorie Garber's inaugural Shakespeare lecture, a trio of attorneys engaged in conservation law who spoke on the endangered waters of Massachusetts, and Park Ranger Emily Murphy's presentation on Richard Derby, Jr.

The inspired Adams Lecture given by David Hackett Fischer, with period music supplied by Glover's Regiment, attracted nearly 200 participants. Also well attended were talks by biographers Megan Marshall and Charlotte Gordon, and the unforgettable theologian John Dominic Crossan who gave the Bentley lecture. Novelist Margot Livesey, poets June Beisch and J. D. Scrimgeour, and historian Timothy Kenslea read from their latest works. And two courses were offered: "Understanding Islam" with Ali Asani and "Jane Austen's World Through History, Literature, and Film" with Maura Henry; both of these drew roughly 25 students. We celebrated National Poetry Month with a community read-in, and we sponsored an Evening of Rare Books at which we learned about both the care and handling of rare books and what makes them "rare" or "collectible."

Nearly all of these events have been further enhanced by exhibitions of relevant works drawn from the Athenæum's extraordinary rare books collection, mounted by Winnie Wilkens and her hard-working volunteers on the Collections Committee. In this way, the dual focus of the Education Committee, providing intellectually enriching programming and highlighting the special collection of books, have been happily united.

It has been an outstanding year, and we are committed to making the next one even better. The Education Committee would welcome your suggestions for lecture or course topics that you would like to see offered.

PREVIEWS:

Emily Murphy will return to give a second lecture on the Derby family. In honor of the centennial of the birth of playwright Samuel Beckett, the noted scholar and director Robert Scanlan will speak October 6th on Beckett's contributions to modern theatre and the perils of directing his plays. Lawrence Buell, winner of the Christian Gauss Award of Phi Beta Kappa, will lecture on Ralph Waldo Emerson, America's first public intellectual. Stephen Greenblatt, whose book Will in the World: How Shakespeare Became Shakespeare was a finalist for the National Book Award and one of the most widely read works of scholarship in 2004, will give the second annual Shakespeare lecture. In honor of Mozart's 250th birthday, we are planning an evening of chamber music at the Athenæum. And to celebrate the

100th anniversary of our building, a special series of events is being planned.

∾ NEW COURSES IN 2006-07 ∾

"A Passage to India: An Exploration into the British Empire in India Through History, Literature, and Film" will be taught by Dr. Maura Henry. This six-week course will explore the issues of race, gender, sexuality, class, cultural exchange, and mythologies of "the other" as they emerge from Britain's colonization of India. In addition to historical accounts of the British in India, various works of literature (such as the novels of E. M. Forster) and films that depict this vexed relationship will be studied.

Dr. Henry offered the delightful Athenæum course on "Jane Austen's World in History, Literature, and Film" this spring. Formerly a lecturer in Harvard's History Department and the Harvard Extension School, she is now Assistant Professor of History at Holyoke Community College, and a faculty member with the Teachers as Scholars program in Boston. She received rave reviews from her Jane Austen students, so we are very pleased that she has agreed to return to us this fall.

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The second course is "Masterpieces of Modern Irish Literature," which will be offered by Dr. Sue Weaver Schopf. This 10-week course will examine selected works of poetry, prose, and drama by some of Ireland's greatest writers, primarily from the 20th century. Despite eight centuries of British rule, acute poverty, and violent struggles between Catholics and Protestants, "Orangemen" and "Free Staters," Ireland has produced four Nobel Prize winners. We will consider how writers have dealt with this history; how the country has been depicted by both insiders and outsiders; and how Irish identity has been represented and stereotyped. Readings will include poems by Thomas Moore, James Clarence Mangan, William Butler Yeats, and Seamus Heaney; fiction by Edith Somerville, Martin Ross, and James Joyce; and plays by J. M. Synge, Lady Gregory, Samuel Beckett, Brendan Behan, Sean O'Casey, and Brian Friel.

Sue is Assistant Dean, Director of the Master of Liberal Arts Program, and Senior Research Advisor in the Humanities in Harvard's Division of Continuing Education, where she also lectures on English and American literature. She previously offered two very popular courses at the Salem Athenæum: "Masterworks of Western Drama" and "Understanding Poetry."

espite the date delay due to rain, twenty volunteers showed up on Saturday May 20th to spruce up the gardens in front and back of the Athaeneum.

By the end of the day, four mature plantings had been moved; minor plants had been relocated; one Norfolk pine added; and many new hosta plants trim the edges of the garden. Leaves were raked, gutters cleared, lawn furniture cleaned, sidewalk swept and edged, the light fixture was repaired. All the chores of the spring clean-up were accomplished in the one very busy day.

Members should note the changes to the streetscape of the grounds, especially in the glade to the right side of the entrance stairway. Several shrubs were moved from the area to allow a view into the back garden.

Part of the landscaping repairs included an attempt to fill a sink-hole on the south-east corner of the building. It turned out to be caused by an abandoned stone well, posibly dating from the late 17th century. Prof. Emerson Baker of Salem State College has volunteered to help us with research.
