Director's Notes

Last year, the Salem Athenaeum looked at Democracy in America as a year-long theme. In 2017, as the sands are shifting in unexpected ways, we turn our thoughts to What Now?

As we investigate this theme, we will bring leading thinkers to Salem to share their insights on where things are heading in arts and culture, science, technology, activism and government. We'll also look to the past to learn from history about constitutional crises, ethics, and more. The series kickoff will be on March 22 with Thomas Forest Farb-Horch discussing developments in biotechnology; next fall, on October 11, acclaimed filmmaker and Syria native, Ziad Hamzeh, will discuss his films and give an artist's perspective on the refugee crisis; veteran journalist and former WGBH-TV news producer, John Carroll, will speak on October 23 about the state of the media. More programs are in development.

Currently underway are a series of events honoring Leslie's Retreat, Salem's foray into the Revolution on February 26, 1775. On April 7, J.L. Bell will speak at the Athenaeum about the new insights he uncovered while researching his book, The Road to Concord. See Lesliesretreat.org for details of events offered from February through April by organizations in Salem and Marblehead.

The Athenaeum's Spring and Fall exhibitions will feature two Salem natives: our most famous literary son, Nathaniel Hawthorne, and the books he read that informed his writing; and the reclusive Harvard-trained artist Quinton Jones, whose paintings and sculptures filled his home to the brim--and will be exhibited here for the first time ever.

Please save the date for the annual Members' Garden Party on Sunday, June 4 and for Salem native, writer and editor, Hannah Tinti, who will read from her new book, The Twelve Lives of Samuel Hawley, on July 28 as part of the Summer Salon Series in the garden.

On June 17, we're putting on the Salem Literary Festival. Attend, volunteer, bring a friend or your whole book group!

Status of the Window Restoration Project

Soucy Insurance Agency The Salem Athenaeum's windows, which are original and were installed in 1906-1907, were in a notable state of decline upon inspection last year. Despite their protection with storm windows, the glazing and wooden members of some of the sashes had deteriorated greatly.

In 2016, the Athenaeum received a matching grant form the Massachusetts Preservation Projects Fund through the Massachusetts Historical Commission (MHC) for \$35,000. In



accordance with its requirements, we developed specifications and advertised for bidders. Window Woman of New England of Amesbury, MA was chosen to do the work and we entered into a contract with them in late 2016. David Hart, Trustee, is leading the project for the Athenaeum.

Window Woman has been working diligently to keep the project on schedule. We visited their shop in January 2017 and observed very professional restoration techniques. We expect that the sash will be reinstalled by May 31, 2017.

The project budget is \$70,000, which means we have to raise the \$35,000 independently. Our fundraising campaign is in progress and we appreciate any and all donations for this important project. We still need \$13,000 to reach our goal!

Help us protect the Athenaeum's building and collections by sponsoring the restoration of the windows to secure the building envelope. All work must be completed and all matching funds must be received by June 30, 2017.

Since 2006, Debra Nagy, a baroque oboist of "consummate taste and expressivity" founded Les Delices and has been bringing together artists with national reputations who share a passion for the exquisite music of the French baroque. Their polished, dynamic performances of masterpieces and little-known works draw rapturous reviews.

With a musical approach that's "distinctly sensual...pliant, warm and sweet" (*The New York Times*), Ms. Nagy expands the repertoire for her instrument with timeless songs whose emotionally charged melodies stir the passions and inspire improvisation with echoes of jazz. Accompanied by a lush continuo band of viola da gamba, theorbo, and harpsichord, she breathes new life into torch songs from the 17th to 20th centuries in this program of original arrangements and improvisations. Music by French masters who served Louis XIV-Michel Lambert (d. 1696) and Sebastien Le Camus (d. 1677)--along with popular Americans Jerome Kern and Nina Simone.

The Salem Connection: A Crucial Part of Massachusetts's Secret Drive to Collect Artillery Before the Revolutionary War

As part of a citywide commemoration of Leslie's Retreat, J. L. Bell presents a lecture that connects the confrontation in Salem on February 26, 1775 (known as "Leslie's Retreat") to the first battle of the American Revolution starting at Concord on April 19, 1775.

J. L. Bell is the proprietor of <u>boston1775.net</u>, a popular website dedicated to the history of the American Revolution in New England. A Fellow of the Massachusetts Historical Society and American Antiquarian Society, he is author of the National Park Service's study of George Washington's work in Cambridge, and has delivered papers to the Massachusetts Historical Society, the Organization of American Historians, and historic sites around greater



Boston. In May 2016, his first book, *The Road to Concord: How Four Stolen Cannon Ignited the Revolutionary War* was published as one of the first series of micro-histories published by the Journal of the American Revolution. The series features meticulous, groundbreaking research and well-written narratives about unknown or lesser-known topics related to the Revolution.


Meetings: March 11, April 8, May 13, June 10
