

President's Report

Dear Members and Friends,

What a year we've had at the Athenæum—208 years and still going strong. We've accomplished several milestones this year and I would like to briefly touch on a few.

With the current debate going on in the city about conservation of versus access to historical materials, we completed the first phase in ensuring that our collections are protected and preserved and will remain in Salem. The Windows Project, which we have discussed in previous meetings was completed in June thanks to a grant by the Massachusetts Historical Commission and the generosity of our members and supporters.

Windows and the basement door were removed, restored, re-glazed, and reinstalled. Storms were added to the ground level windows for the first time and each of the storm and other outside windows had new UV-blocking film installed.

Another multi-year project completed this year was a comprehensive collections policy. We also continue to work on a building and maintenance assessment that will guide us in planning for the maintenance and replacement of systems and fixtures throughout the property.

I'm happy to report that our financial situation is stable and that our modest endowment, under the supervision of our new advisors, has grown. We do, however, face significant challenges that center around maintaining an historic property and making it fit for modern use. We are in need of more useable space for our expanding programs, for staff and volunteer work and to provide access to all who wish to participate. Painting, fencing, mechanical systems in need of repair and upgrades, and other deferred projects are a consistent need. We were fortunate recently, that when our boiler failed, most of the \$30,000 cost to replace it was covered by a rider suggested by the Soucy Insurance Agency. That incident alone could have changed the tenor of our financial situation completely. So, we are thankful not only for their foresight but for their generosity in sponsoring our programs this past year, along with Landry & Arcari, Salem Five, Beverly Bank and Marblehead Bank.

We are also thankful to you, our Proprietors and Subscribers, for your considerable contributions in talent and treasure that keep this organization vibrant and relevant in this modern age.

The Athenæum, at its heart, is a volunteer organization. So, I want to add my personal thanks to the members of the Board of Trustees who give so much of their time and effort, to our army of volunteers, our sponsors, our Subscribers and our Proprietors who, for over two centuries, have served the literary and cultural interests of Salem and the North Shore.

Finally, all that we do could not be accomplished with the hard work and dedication of our staff. Jean Marie Procious our Executive Director, and Carolyn McGuire continue to steer this ship on a proper course despite the often-inclement weather that face institutions such as ours.

Letter from the Executive Director

A casual visitor might not see the Athenæum change from year to year. 337 Essex Street, our home since 1907, accommodates visitors at its original tables and chairs. The card catalog remains an essential tool even in this digital age. The activities the building hosts, however, continue to evolve as the needs of the Athenæum community do.

Based on your feedback, we have updated our cultural programs to include more performances such as storytelling and the If Music Could Talk series. New workshops and joint readings like The Writer in Your Neighborhood events also provide new opportunities to create and share with one another. Another programming first for us this year was the solo-artist Quinton Oliver Jones show. We are truly grateful to Connie and Dale Gephart for introducing this intriguing artist to the public and enlivening the library with his paintings and sculptures on display throughout the main level.

The Athenæum's reach now extends beyond the walls of our building. Through the Salem Literary Festival, we celebrate books and reading and the power of stories with a broader public. Our Spring/Summer exhibition, "What Hawthorne Read," has become our first traveling show and is currently reaching new audiences at the Portsmouth Athenæum.

We also continue to refine and preserve our offerings here at 337 Essex Street. This past year we invested in more robust WiFi to support work and research throughout the building and grounds. We also continue to implement our plans for security improvements with cameras and environmental monitoring to better secure and preserve the special collections. With your direct sponsorships, we have conserved 100 of our most precious volumes since the launching of the Adopt-a-Book program in 2012.

Over the past decade, the Athenæum has been consistently, if modestly, growing its membership and bringing in new audiences, while addressing deferred maintenance projects and modernizing collections care and access.Volunteers have been integral to the Athenæum's growth, and many of these projects would never have been possible without their strong support. We have reached a point, however, where we need additional staff to manage essential services.

In January, Carolyn McGuire started a new half-time position, Program and Communications Manager, overseeing our cultural offerings which have increased 65% over the past four years alone. We intend to hire additional staff soon for administrative services and eventually library services as well. We heartily thank Kirsten Alexander who served as Development Consultant for 15 months and helped us raise matching funds for the Windows Restoration Project and launch our first Lit Fest last June. We intend to continue strategically employing professional services consultants to address needs we cannot ourselves meet. Together with the contributions of our volunteers, these professional roles will help us as we plan the next decade of maintenance, innovation, and growth.



Annual Report of Activities

- Inspired by Robert Pinsky's Favorite Poem Project (www.favoritepoem. org), the Athenaeum Writers Committee hosted a Favorite Poem reading to celebrate National Poetry Month on April 2. A fascinating mix of poems were shared and just as entertaining were the brief stories about what made them favorites.
- Madison Borden received the 2017 Salem Athenæum Literary Award, which is given to the graduating Salem High student who is most distinguished by his or her abiding curiosity, intellectual engagement, and passion for literature.
- With your great generosity and support, the Athenæum matched a \$35,000 grant from the Massachusetts Preservation Projects Fund through the Massachusetts Historical Commission on time by June 30, 2017. The \$70,000 project repaired and restored the Athenæum's original wood windows and the wood basement door. Storm windows were installed on the ground level windows for the first time and UV-blocking film was installed on storms and windows throughout the building to protect the furnishings and collections and reduce energy consumption.
- On June 2, 2017, YesNo Press presented a night of poetry by Liz Hutchinson, K.T. Landon, and M.P. Carver in celebration of Liz's new book *Animalalia*.
- The Athenæum had a booth at the Salem Farmers Market last August where we met new friends and invited many residents to attend our programs or come for a visit. At a small pop-up book sale offering culinary and gardening titles and some great beach reading, we also made a few dollars and promoted the main book sale event in September.
- Mass Poetry Fest: A Celebration of the Salem Poetry Seminar, was held on May 4. This reunion and group reading was held as a kick-off event for the 2017 Mass Poetry Fest. The week-long Salem Poetry Seminar brings together twelve students selected from Massachusetts public universities to study poetry writing intensively with noted teachers and authors such as Charlotte Gordon, J.D. Scrimgeour and Richard Hoffman. Jointly presented by Salem State University and the Athenæum, the Seminar has been held seven times since 2000, including June 5-10, 2017, and has guided many young writers in finding their identities as poets. Students stay at SSU and the Athenaeum hosts classes and workshops during the day with free public readings each evening.
- On June 17, 2017 the Salem Athenæum presented the 8th Salem Literary Festival, an exciting day of literary adventures for teens and adults with awardwinning and best-selling writers: Deborah Cramer, Laura Harrington, Katherine Howe, Kathleen Kent, Crystal King, Louise Miller, Laurie Stolarz, Peter Swanson,

M.P. Carver, and Matthew Phillion. Brunonia Barry and M.T.Anderson gave opening and closing keynote addresses. Activities included author readings, lunch with the authors, free youth writing workshops, and panel discussions on culinary fiction, nature writing, crafting thrillers, and writing about Salem now and about its storied past.

- We co-presented with other organizations three lectures this year: the annual Salem History Lecture, with Historic Salem, Inc., featured John Tschirch, *A Tale of Two Seaports: Salem and Newport* on March 16.As part of a citywide commemoration of Leslie's Retreat, we hosted J.L. Bell's lecture, The Salem Connection: A Crucial Part of Massachusetts's Secret Drive to Collect Artillery Before the Revolutionary War on April 7. On October 20, Peter Manseau presented Phantoms, Fraud and Photography, hosted by Harmony Grove Cemetery, the Salem Athenæum, and the Salem Historical Society.
- The Technicolor Funky Munchie Daydream Experience, our 1960s-themed fundraising party, brought many new and old friends to the Athenæum for an evening of peace, love and music. Many thanks to the contributors who donated items and services to the auction, the host committee and volunteers, and to the guests who attended and bid at the auction. Dame Edna (Ken Harris) was hostess and auctioneer extraordinaire and Rule of Three entertained us with their rockin' beats.

 The Athenæum had its first solo-artist exhibit with Quinton Oliver Jones: A Salem Artist Discovered. Aptly named, most of his body of work had never been seen by the public before the opening on September 22. Jones' niece, Connie Gephart, and her husband, Dale, curated the show and hosted several related programs. On October 4, Connie Gephart presented the lecture, Introducing Salem Artist Quinton Oliver Jones (1903-1999) to orient viewers to Jones' colorful, fantastical visions



and shared the world in which he lived and drew inspiration for his artwork. On the weekend of November 11-12, the Gepharts hosted a guided tour of his former home, including his workspace and many more paintings and sculptures. It was a special opportunity to experience the environment in which Jones created his artwork and we are immensely grateful to the Gepharts and their family for their generosity. To close out the exhibit, an Ekphrastic Poetry Reading held on February 9 featured local writers reading their poems written in response to the Jones' works on display at the Athenæum.

- Writing the Next Chapter with Our Refugee Neighbors was a very special event featuring refugees who have recently arrived in the United States and are now living on the North Shore. They had the opportunity to share their stories in their own words and through interviews that had previously been conducted by a panel of local writers. Photographer Leah Bokenkamp contributed portrait panels that were on display at the Athenæum during the event. Inspired by her work with Catholic Charities, Salem State Professor and Athenæum member Elisabeth Weiss Horowitz started this program to assist refugee immigrants with English language instruction and to introduce these new neighbors to our community. The panel also included M.P. Carver, Shari D. Frost, Danielle Jones-Pruett and Keri Snook. The event on November 5 filled the Reading Room to capacity. To share the stories more widely, the portrait panels featuring the participating refugees were exhibited in the Reading Room for a week afterward.
- In January the Athenæum launched If Music Could Talk, a new series created and hosted by Trustee, Si Fisk. These musical performances include brief demonstrations, conversations about music, and audience interaction. The first program was The Story of Musical Notation with Thomas Forrest Kelly, the Morton B. Knafel Professor of Music, former chair of Harvard's Music Department, and an expert in Medieval music.

Financial Position

The fiscal-year ended March 31, 2018, saw the Athenaeum reporting Operating Income (unaudited) of \$12,774.90 – a meaningful increase over the budgeted \$2,851.50. In keeping with our past Board practice, Net Income will be designated as Board-restricted funds. With both Income and Operating Expenses coming in short of plan, the former largely a result of lower Development Income, the primary factor behind the significant Operating Income variance is in Payroll accounts. While there are some timing differences reflected in the Payroll number, the reduced amount shown (as well as the lower Development Income figure) are each tied to changes in staffing for development activities.

Once again in this fiscal year, major capital spending was largely offset by outside income/reimbursement sources. We spent significant funds for the Windows project which was largely offset by generous support from loyal individual donors as well as with grant proceeds from the Massachusetts Historical Commission.

The Organization's balance sheet remains liquid and unleveraged, with no outstanding liabilities at year-end and ample cash and equivalents in operating and investment accounts. At the end of the fiscal year, the endowment stood at \$1,449,959. This figure is up nearly \$100,000 from FYE'17, but is net of over \$55,000 of withdrawals used to support the Athenæum's operations, and approximately \$15,000 in management fees paid to our advisor, Appleton Partners.

The Salem Athenæum remains on stable financial footing with significant value in the organization's collections, real estate and investment holdings, despite ongoing reliance on endowment income and fundraising to support annual operations.

The Athenaeum's accounting firm, Vesey & Weeks, will soon begin preparation of the annual financial statements. Their work should be completed in June.
